At Clarendon Primary it is fundamental that every child reaches their full potential, developing their skills and love of reading. We teach children both how

to learn to read and to read to learn. Learning to read focuses primarily on the phonics skills of the pupils and being able to decode and blend sounds to read. Reading to learn focuses upon the reciprocal reading skills children require to read for pleasure and to develop subject knowledge. These reciprocal reading skills are taught explicitly in our guided reading lessons, in group and whole class. We all encourage reading for pleasure, with opportunities throughout the school day.

Throughout the year we offer all learners regular opportunities to achieve and develop confidence and self-esteem through hands-on outdoor learning experiences. Iveta, our recently qualified Forest School Leader, now takes two classes off site for weekly forest school sessions.



Being the Best that We Can Be: Cultural Capital and Enrichment

Cultural capital is the accumulation of knowledge, behaviours and skills that a pupil can draw upon and which demonstrates their cultural awareness and knowledge. Clarendon as 'A Place of Learning for Everyone' promotes cultural capital, giving a pupil power, helping them achieve goals and the desire to aspire and draw upon success.

How do we promote cultural capital through enrichment?

We strive for every child to have the chance to access a wealth of experiences,

through a variety of ways. At Clarendon Primary we endeavour to ensure that all pupils from Reception up to Year 6 have the opportunity to have tailored visits to the surrounding community and beyond. We take advantage of our prime position and opportunities within and around Hampton, enabling our pupils to experience all that it has to offer in



terms of its social, historical and geographical content. Our curriculum and

learning takes place both in and out of the classroom, where we plan activities to be broad and enriching. Learning from first-hand experience is very powerful and provides lasting impact.

Our link with Park Lane Stables in Richmond, enables pupils to have the opportunity to experience and engage with horses. This is personalised around pupil's needs, from the enjoyment of understanding their habitat and how to look after them, where pupils often need this to gain the

confidence to stroke, ride on a carriage and then on the horse itself.

It is Galaxy class pupils' turn for swimming this term, where they return from their weekly lessons proudly talking about the new skills that they are learning, with clear goals for next week's lesson.





At Clarendon Primary Centre we are excited to be undertaking training in the NEST programme. NEST stands for Nurturing Environments Specialist Training and is designed to help staff understand and support

pupils with sensory processing and communication difficulties. All teaching and support staff are thinking about how best to shape the school environment to support pupils. They are learning to identify needs and select sensory and communication
